MISSION STATEMENT

The North American Division Mission Statement was read by Roscoe J Howard, III.

QUORUM

Roscoe J Howard, III, Secretary of the North American Division, verified the presence of a quorum.

CALL TO ORDER

VOTED, To call to order the first business session of the 2004 Year-end Meeting.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Roscoe Howard, III, North American Division secretary, presented an encouraging report of Adventist church growth.

World church membership, as of mid-year 2004, is 13,663,497. The number of accessions (baptisms and professions of faith) during the past four quarters was 1,006,492, the second time in Adventist history that the number has exceeded one million. This breaks down to 2,756 accessions every day, or one baptism every 31 seconds. This time last year, one Adventist for every 480 people was reported, compared to this year's figure of one for every 468. One Adventist for every 299 people is projected for 2014.

North American Division membership has passed the one million mark-1,000,407 as of October 21, 2004! The total number of NAD church plants for 2000-2003 is 596, and 30,000 is the average number of baptisms per year.

NAD challenges for the future include congregationalism, unity in diversity, and global church growth (NAD's influence on the world church and its mission focus). He described the church's future charge as taking the gospel message to all North Americans, preparing for Christ's second coming, and reaching out to a dying world in tangible ways that show Jesus' love for humanity.

VOTED, To receive the report of the secretary.

TREASURER'S REPORT

To highlight church growth during the last 100 years, NAD treasurer Juan Prestol informed delegates that in 1904, total church membership was 81,721, with a tithe income of \$691,819. These figures contrasted today's world membership of more than 13 million, and NAD's 2003 tithe income of \$727,180,606. The church experienced a tithe increase of 2.7%, or \$19,375,457, over 2002 income, with the

highest per capita increase occurring in Bermuda. Currently, there is a five percent increase in tithe in 2004 compared to this time last year.

He presented graphs that illustrated the following tithe-expense breakdown:

- General Conference expenses to missionaries-1.89%
- Net amount retained by unions-2.59%
- Retirement defined benefit-9%
- GC institution appropriations-.44%
- GC operations-3.13%
- GC appropriations-1.02%
- GC appropriations to overseas divisions-2.52%
- NAD operating-1%
- Retirement defined contributions-3%
- Amount retained or spent on behalf of local conferences-75.41%

The projected NAD tithe income for 2010 is \$1,011,081,295. Every Sabbath about \$22 million is put into the offering plate.

He expressed gratitude to God for His abundant blessings during this past year and ended his presentation with the following quotation:

"In the service of God there need be no despondency, no wavering, no fear. The Lord will fulfill the highest expectations of those who put their trust in Him. He will give them the wisdom their varied necessities demand." Patriarchs and Prophets, p 387.

517-04Na SMALL GROUP MINISTRIES (NAD SUPPLEMENT TO CHURCH MANUAL)—CHURCH MANUAL ADDITION

VOTED, To add a new section, Small Group Ministries, to the North American Division Supplement of the *Seventh-day Adventist Church Manual*, 17th edition, which will be revised after the General Conference Session in July 2005.

Small Group Ministries

Moses organized Israel into groups of ten (Ex. 18). Jesus chose a group of twelve and spent most of His ministry with them. He often taught in private homes (Matt. 13:36, 17:25; Mark 9:33, 10:10). The New Testament church centered its activities on small groups, in fellowship, study, sharing, praying, and eating together (Acts 2:42, 46). Acts has nine references to Christians worshiping in homes.

In North America and many other parts of the world, the Seventh-day Adventist Church began with local churches that were small, informal groups and met in homes. Ellen G White emphasizes, "The formation of small companies as a basis of Christian effort is a plan that has been presented before me by One who cannot err. If there is a large number in the church, let the members be formed into small companies, to work not only for the church members but for unbelievers also" (Evangelism, p 115).

As early as 1871 she wrote specific instructions for "How to Conduct Meetings": that were the same in purpose and procedure as small group ministries today. (See *Review and Herald*, May 30, 1871: reprinted in *Testimonies for the Church*, Volume 2, pp. 577-582.)

The life of the body is in its cells. If the cell dies, the body eventually dies. If the cells are healthy, the body is healthy. When the cells multiply, the body grows. A study of church movements shows that every major revival has been influenced by a ready access to the Bible and the gathering of believers in small, intimate groups.

Our society is known for massive mobility and migration. People get uprooted from family and friends, many of them moving to distant cities. Loneliness is a key word of our time. The small group becomes a substitute family, and it meets a special need. Strangers are accepted regardless of cultural, ethnic, or religious background. They are loved regardless of sin or skin color.

Bible Study Fellowships

Purpose—Bible study fellowships aim to both revive members and attract nonmembers. They provide an excellent means of reconnecting with inactive members. A strong emphasis of such groups is fellowship. Both the small size and the informal setting are more conducive to fellowship than the regular church setting. Even individuals not ready to identify with the church feel comfortable in the nonthreatening atmosphere of a small group.

Format—Groups should be no smaller than four or larger than fifteen. They should meet regularly, weekly, bi-weekly or at least monthly. They can meet in homes, at a place of work or suitable meeting rooms in the community. Meetings last an hour or two and typically include three parts:

- 1. Sharing: Most small groups have their sharing time at the beginning of each meeting. The sharing of joys, blessings, and disappointments is a natural way to begin a meeting. It relieves tensions, provides honest affirmation, and creates a warm group spirit. Dialogue is the key to success. No one must be allowed to dominate the group.
- 2. Bible study: The group may choose a book of the Bible or use a study guide. Members study agreed sections of the material during the week, and discuss it with the group at the meetings. The leader probes for answers to such questions as "What does the author say in this text?" and "What does God say to me through this passage?"
- 3. Prayer: The group compiles a list of prayer topics, including concerns and praises. It is important that they pray for one another, as well as for specific projects that the group may be involved or interested in. Time should be allowed for short prayers by each person who wishes to do so.

Ministry Groups

Small groups can, of course, meet at the church and be made up of those having special interests or needs. Examples include seminar groups—family life seminars, parenting classes, coping seminars, Bible study classes, and a range of seminars covering physical, mental, and spiritual health—as well as support groups for individuals with specific needs, Sabbath School classes, and activity groups.

Mission Groups

Small groups can be sponsored by a local church as the first step in beginning work in a previously unentered community in the same way that branch Sabbath Schools and cottage meetings have been used by Seventh-day Adventists since the 19th century. Research shows that new congregations begun with small groups are much stronger than those started simply by gathering a larger assembly.

A small group which gathers in a home for Bible study, fellowship, and worship requires little if any funding, and removes the barrier of cost from advancing the mission of the Church. Where the conference cannot afford to fund additional pastors, mission groups throughout a metropolitan area or rural region can continue to be affiliated with an established church. Small group leaders function under supervision of the district pastor.

How to Begin

Small group ministries require lay leaders and the pastor's greatest contribution is in recruiting and training the leaders. These lay leaders invite friends, acquaintances and neighbors to join their groups.

At the first meeting there should be a written statement or group covenant which explains the goal of the group and the ground rules. The group should be asked to help shape this brief, concise document (usually not more than one page). It would typically include an agreement to meet weekly for a specified number of weeks (6, 10, 13 or 26, for example), to attend every meeting unless ill or out of town, to read the assigned material between meetings, to protect confidences, to refrain from negative statements about other people or organizations, and to invite others into the group. Those unable to support the covenant agreed upon at the first meeting should be allowed to withdraw gracefully.

VOTED, To add a new section, Ministry Development Committee, to the North American Division Supplement of the Seventh-day Adventist Church Manual, 17th edition, which will be revised after the General Conference Session in July 2005.

Ministry Development Committee

Involving Every Member in Ministry—The biblical word laos, from which we get our word "laity", has nothing to do with amateur or secondary status within the church. Rather, it includes the entire people of God, including the clergy. We really misuse the term when we use it to describe assistants in or supporters of the clergy. We use it correctly when we mean associates in ministry. "Not upon the ordained minister only rests the responsibility of going forth to fulfill this commission. Everyone who has received Christ is called to work for the salvation of his fellow men." (The Acts of the Apostles, p. 110).

At His ascension Christ gave to His church an overwhelming task: "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). To His tiny group of followers the work seemed an impossible assignment until they understood His plan for its fulfillment.

Here's the plan: "But each of us has been given his gift, his due portion of Christ's bounty. Therefore Scripture says: 'He ascended into the heights with captives in his train; he gave gifts to men.' ... And these were his gifts: some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip God's people for work in his service, to the building up of the body of Christ" (Eph. 4:7-13, NEB).

The gospel commission is overwhelming, but the provision for its fulfillment is overabundant. When Jesus went away, the Holy Spirit was given to His followers, bringing to each a gift or gifts for ministering, "distributing to each one individually as He wills" (1 Cor. 12:11). Everyone receiving the Holy

Spirit receives a ministering gift designated by the Spirit to be used in ministry for Christ. To say we have no spiritual gift is to say we have no Holy Spirit. (Portions of this material are quoted from *The Seventh-day Adventist Minister's Handbook*, Chapter 11, p 121.)

This spiritual gift is presumably related to some talent we already have. And the Holy Spirit urges us to find a ministry whereby the gift can be used to serve others and to attract them to Christ. Under this plan there is no hierarchy. Everyone is a minister performing some ministry for which he or she has been specially gifted.

An Optional Approach to Gifts-based Ministry—In order to assure that every church member is matched with an appropriate ministry as part of the congregation's overall mission strategy, some local churches may choose to give a special assignment to the nominating committee. The assignment is to go beyond simply filling the jobs listed in the Church Manual and to consider every name on the membership list, contacting every member and finding some role for each member to be involved in ministry.

This approach takes considerable time for prayerful consideration and careful dialogue with each member, therefore the nominating committee operates on a regular basis throughout the year, meeting monthly or even weekly (depending on the size of the church). Some churches may label the nominating committee as the Ministry Development Committee in order to make it clear that there are unusual expectations for the total involvement of all the members. None of these arrangements violate the guidelines for the church election presented in the *Church Manual* so long as the committee is appointed by vote of the congregation and reports to the congregation for a vote on its nominees.

Another alternative is for the church to appoint both a nominating committee and a separate Ministry Development Committee. The nominating committee may focus only on those individuals nominated to be members of the church board, while the Ministry Development Committee works to involve all of the other church members in some appropriate ministry.

The North American Division provides curriculum resources for those local churches that seek to involve every member in ministry based on a biblical understanding of spiritual gifts. *Connections* is published under the auspices of the Church Resources Consortium for this purpose. It provides specific training and tools for the Ministry Development Committee. The curriculum is designed so that it can also be used by local churches which choose not to have a Ministry Development Committee and use a more traditional approach.

VOTED, To adopt a new policy, NAD CA 25, Model Local Mission Operating Policy, which reads as follows:

CA 25 MODEL LOCAL MISSION OPERATING POLICY

CA 25 05 Local Mission—The following Model Local Mission Operating Policy shall be followed as closely as possible by all local missions. Those sections of the model operating policy that appear in bold print are essential to the unity of the Church worldwide and shall be included in the operating policy for each local mission. Other sections of the model operating policy may be modified as set out in Article XIV, provided they continue to be in full harmony with the provisions of this model. Any other modifications needed to meet specific conditions in a local mission or field shall be submitted to the respective division committee for consideration. Amendments to the Model Local Mission Operating Policy shall be made by action of the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists at any Annual Council of that committee.

Operating Policy of the	Mission of Seventh-day Adventists
Article	I—Name
This organization, which is a subsidiary of Seventh-day Adventists, shall be known as the hereinafter referred to as the mission.	

Article II—Purpose

The purpose of this mission is to facilitate the proclamation of the everlasting gospel in the context of the three angels' messages of Revelation 14:6-12 to all peoples within its territory, leading them to accept Jesus as personal Saviour and to unite with His Church, and nurturing them in preparation for His soon return.

Article III—Territory

The territory of this mission shall consist of
Article IV—Membership
The membership of this mission shall consist of such churches as have been or shall be properly organized in any part of the territory under its jurisdiction and accepted by vote of the delegates assembled in a mission session.
Article V—Sessions
Sec. 1. Regular Sessions: This mission shall hold regular sessions at such time and place as the mission committee in counsel with the officers of the union mission/union conference shall designate by written notice sent to all churches and companies at least thirty days prior to the session.
Sec. 2. Session Business: The regular business of the session will be to receive reports of the president, secretary, treasurer (based on audited statements), departmental directors, and the auditor's reports, and to approve self-reliance plans for the local mission, which should contain specific, detailed incremental plans for moving the local mission toward local conference status.
Sec. 3. Session Elections: This mission in session shall elect the departmental directors of the mission, and the elective members of the mission executive committee, who shall hold their offices for the period of years or until their successors are elected and enter upon their duties.
Sec. 4. Special Sessions: The mission committee may, upon approval of the union committee, call a special session at such time and place as it may deem proper by a like notice, and the transactions of such sessions shall have the same force as those of the regular sessions. The union may also call a special session of the mission.
Sec. 5. Temporary Committees: Previous to each session of the mission the executive committee shall provide for such temporary committees as may be necessary to conduct the preliminary work of the session.
Sec. 6. Organizing Committee: An organizing committee for each constituency meeting shall nominate a nominating committee and such other committees as may be needed for the session, with nominees subject to the approval of the constituency delegates. The organizing committee shall consist of representatives from each church and each mission operated institution, and the president of the Union, or his designee, who shall serve as chairperson.
Sec. 7. Nominating Committee: The nominating committee shall consist of members, including the president of the Union, or his designee, who shall serve as chairperson.
Sec. 8. Voting: The voting on all matters of business shall be by viva voce unless otherwise demanded by a majority of the delegates present. Only those delegates who are present in person at any constituency meeting shall be eligible to vote. There shall be no voting by proxy.

Sec. 4. Meetings of the mission committee may be called at any time or place by the president, or should he be absent from the field, such meetings may be called by the secretary upon the written request of any three members of the mission committee.

Article VIII—Officers and Their Duties

Sec. 1. Executive Officers: The executive officers of this mission shall be a president, a secretary, and a treasurer. The secretary and treasurer may be one individual known as the secretary-treasurer. It is the duty of these officers, in consultation with one another, to carry forward the work according to plans, policies, and programs voted by the constituency and/or the mission executive committee. These plans, policies, and programs shall be in harmony with the doctrines and actions adopted and approved by the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists in its quinquennial sessions.

The executive officers of this mission shall be appointed by the union at the time of its sessions and shall be members of the local mission committee. Vacancies in such offices shall be filled by action of the union executive committee.

President: The president, who shall be an ordained minister of experience, is the

first officer and shall report to the mission committee in consultation with the secretary and the treasurer. He shall act as chairman of the constituency meetings and of the mission committee and serve in the general interests of the mission as the constituency and the mission committee shall
determine. In his leadership he shall adhere to the policies of the Union, the
Division and of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, work in harmony with the union
committee, and in close counsel with the union officers. When a local mission president is to be absent
from the field for prolonged periods of time, the mission committee shall be authorized, in counsel with the
union officers, to appoint an individual to act as chairperson during such absence.
b. Secretary: The secretary, associated with the president as an executive officer,
shall serve under the direction of the mission committee and shall act as vice-chairperson of the
mission committee. The secretary shall report to the mission committee after consultation with the
president. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the minutes of the mission sessions and of the

The fixing of wages within this mission shall be carried out in harmony with the policies fixed by the Division.
All accounting records of this mission shall be audited at least annually by an auditor designated by the General Conference Auditing Service; and the records of this mission or any of its subsidiaries, agencies, or institutions shall at all times be open to said auditor.
Article XII—Indemnification
Sec. 1. To the extent permitted by law, this mission shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending, or completed action, suit, or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, because he/she is or was a member of the mission executive committee or an officer, employee, or agent of the mission against expenses (including legal fees), judgments, fines, and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him/her in connection with such action, suit, or proceeding if he/she acted in good faith and in a manner he/she reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interest of the mission, and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, had no reasonable cause to believe his/her conduct was unlawful.
Sec. 2. This right of indemnification shall be in addition to, and not exclusive of, all other rights to which such member of the executive committee, officer, or department director may be entitled. (Note: This right of indemnification may be expanded or contracted as allowed under local law and as adopted by the constituents.)
Article XIII—Dissolution and Disposition of Assets
This mission may be dissolved only by action of the union executive committee.
In the event of the dissolution of this mission, all assets remaining after all claims have been satisfied shall be transferred to a legal entity authorized by the Division of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.
Article XIV—Amendments
At any annual meeting of the Union Mission/Union Conference Executive Committee, this operating policy may be amended by a majority vote, provided that such amendments shall not be inconsistent with the Constitution of the General Conference and the working policy of the Division of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventist and with the spirit of the Model Local Mission Operating Policy. However, those portions of this operating policy which are essential to the unity of the Church worldwide and are designated in print shall only be amended or revised from time to time by the Union Mission/Union Conference Executive Committee by a two-thirds majority vote, in order to comply with changes to the Model Local Mission Operating Policy as voted by the General Conference Executive Committee in its annual meetings.

510-04N NON-MINISTERIAL EMPLOYEES (DENOMINATIONAL EMPLOYEES CLASSIFICATION AND ACCREDITATION)—POLICY AMENDMENT

VOTED, To amend NAD D 05 15, Non-Ministerial Employees, to read as follows:

- D 05 15 Non-Ministerial Employees—*1. Administrative Ministries Credential—To non-ministerial employees who are in leadership positions with not less than five years in denominational service. These individuals have demonstrated proficiency in the responsibilities assigned to them and are salaried employees in the denominational remuneration scale. These may include North American Division, union, conference and institutional officers and administrators, directors and associate directors.
- *2. Administrative Ministries License—To non-ministerial employees who are leaders with limited experience (less than five years) including North American Division union, conference and institutional officers and administrators, directors and associate directors.
- 4.3. Missionary Credential—To employees with significant experience in denominational service, usually not less than five years, who demonstrate proficiency in the responsibilities assigned to them and whose remuneration is at approximately the maximum for their category in the denominational remuneration scale. These will may include regularly employed conference and union institutional field, institution and office employees, and career literature evangelists and Bible instructors.
- 2.4. Missionary License—To employees with limited experience (less than five years) including regularly employed field, institutional and office employees.
